Hello Neighbors - Our names are Ruth and Ronnie. We reside in Golden Keys and our ancestors have lived here for years. They immigrated from Arcadia just after 2001 and we are proud to say we are now 10th or 11th generation residents. We have had the opportunity to meet many of you (generally at night) and look forward to meeting the rest.

Where do we live? That's easy – we probably live at your house or at least on your property - if not us then most likely several dozen cousins live with you. We spend 90% of our lives living 4 feet or more above ground. You might see us in a swimming pool, attics, garages, patios, property walls, and when we are really frisky, inside the walls of your homes! We start getting more active around November so keep an eye out for us.

You don't need to feed us. The fruit on your citrus trees is a bountiful. We eat all kinds of citrus, figs, pomegranates, soft-skinned fruits, and veggies - and the cool thing is we don't care if it is ripe! 
Scottsdale Philharmonic Free Concert

As a Weight Watcher member, I've enjoyed many delicious recipes. Since I have not had anyone send a recipe, I decided to share this Greek-inspired dish. Stuffed Chicken Breast:

1 Tbsp Olive Oil, divided
1 small onion chopped
10 oz Fresh spinach
1 tsp lemon zest
¼ cup feta cheese, crumbled
1 tsp table salt, divided
½ tsp black pepper, divided

1 pound uncooked boneless skinless chicken breast cutlets pounded thin In a large nonstick skillet, heat 1 teaspoon oil over medium high heat; sauté onion until golden, about 5 minutes. Add Spinach and cook until wilted

In a medium bowl, combine onion, spinach, zest, feta, ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper; set aside.

Evenly divide onion-spinach mixture over chicken, roll up and secure with toothpicks; sprinkle with remaining sale and pepper.

In same skillet heat remaining 2 teaspoons oil over medium high heat. Cook chicken, turning occasionally, until golden brown and cooked through, about 10 minutes. Remove toothpicks and serve.

Minutes of July 25, 2017, Executive Committee - 3:00 PM Golden Keys Homeowners Association Clubhouse

Committee Members present: Shelly Lear, Martha Spruell, and Tom Kernen Approximately 03 members and guests were in attendance Meeting was called to order at3:00 PM by Mr. Kernen.

Agenda presented by Mr. Kernen.

New Business

 AZ Metroscapes irrigation repair of all the inside zones of the clubhouse grounds heads, rotors, risers, nozzles and other miscellaneous items. The original system was put in without overlapping of heads or rotors, that combined with our low water pressure cause bald grassless areas. This repair should decrease the underserved sprinkler coverage, and promote grass growth. Estimate \$1,472.90.

Motion to have the work performed by AZ Metroscapes as described in item 1. Seconded. Discussion followed. Motion approved.

 AZ Metroscapes irrigation repair of the flower trellis area in the pool entry. The current lines are over top spray heads that spray water on the metal work causing erosion and rust. Changing them to ground level will reduce the water hitting the metal and will prolong the life expectancy - at a cost of \$173.10.

Motion to have the work performed by AZ Metroscapes as described in item 2. Seconded. Discussion followed. Motion approved.

Amended by Mr. Kernen: Landscape committee is approved to consider and implement alternative sources of color planting including additional "woks" and then re-purposing the trellis area for drought tolerant planting. Seconded. Discussion followed. Motion approved as amended.

- 3. Removal of the large juniper bush on the south side of the pool. It is overgrown, and trimming is not an option on an evergreen bush. This bush has become an issue for the pool; dropping debris in the pool, and impeding the passage on both sides of the bush.
 - Motion to have the work performed by AZ Metroscapes as described in item 3. Seconded. Discussion followed. Motion approved. Discussion followed. Motion approved.
- 4. Flag pole replacement by American Flag. Our flag pole bent during the July 16th storm. Barry Downs & Bruce Bourne feel it is beyond repair. It has been repaired at least 3 times in the last 4 years. The quote includes a 4" steel pole, installation, cement work, and it comes with a 5 year warranty. We will also need to purchase a flag (approx.. \$25.00), it is not included. Estimate \$1,370.35.

Motion to have the work performed by American Flag and Pole as described in item 4 plus a new American Flag. Seconded. Discussion followed – Mr. Chuck Colella will contact our insurance company to determine if the loss will be covered and the deductible amount, if any. He will also ask if such a claim would have a future negative impact on our rates at the time of renewal. Motion approved.

Meeting adjourned at 3:36PM.

- 1. Bank accounts are balanced as of August 31, 2017.
- 2. A new CD was purchased through Vanguard which represents the HOA's 2017 contribution to our reserves funding. This is a 1-year CD at an interest rate of 1.40%.
- 3. The Thrivent CD matured on September 7 and the funds are being transferred to Vanguard to purchase additional CD's to support our laddering strategy. Redemption value was in excess of \$106,000.00. I am reviewing our options to buy multiple CD's with varying lengths of maturity.
- 4. I am asking all Committee Chairs to review their expenditures in view of the amount budgeted. To meet our goals, each committee must manage expenses to their budget or propose a plan to resolve overages. I am available to meet or speak to any committee wishing my inpout.
- 5. All other activity was business as usual.

After the gas has been turned on, Swimming Pool Service and Repair will check the heaters. I'm hoping the pool will be warmed to 85 degrees by Oct. 1st.

The new pool lights make the pool lovely in the evening. And, there are no UV rays of any kind after the sun sets. It is a wonderful time of the day to be at the pool. Think about a refreshing swim in the evening.

Barry Downs and I are going to obtain bids for cleaning, painting, and sealing the cool deck. If approved, the work will be done when the pool is not heated.

Landscape -AZ Metroscapes:

The irrigation system upgrade in August was very successful, we will continue to work with AZ Metroscapes to try and reduce the two areas that the sprinklers are not reaching.

Some of the oleanders around the AC unit are infected with Oleander Leaf Scorch, we are still watching them. It is possible that we might have to cut the stumps below the ground level and spray to kill further growth.

The large overgrown arborvitae bush on the North side of the pool has been removed. It had become an issue for the pool; plant debris falling in the water and impeding passage on both sides of the bush. This was voted on in Executive session on July 25, 2017. In the coming months the committee will address the electric that is located in the planter area as well as researching plants that will work in that area without water.

63rd Canal | Salt River Project | City of Scottsdale | Painting Metzger's:

The City of Scottsdale has finished cleaning out the trees from the southerly end of 63^{rd} canal right of way. We have a homeless person living in the area that SRP cleaned up in July. I will be making contact with the police community advocate, SRP & the City to see what action we need to take to clear that out again. I hope to have the painting of the wall completed before the years end; it has been a challenge so I am making no promises. Ants Around Club House Grounds:

There has been an infestation of small red & black ants by the old shuffle boards and outside the club house grounds along Pinchot and 63rd place. Ant powder poison has been placed around the small mounds and is working nicely to kill them off. It was reported that ants were on the pool decking by the chairs, we found none the 3 days we were placing ant powder.

Flag Pole: Contact: American Flag 602-495-1776.

At the July 25, 2017 Executive meeting we approved American Flag Co. to replace our flagpole with estimate of \$1370.35. This includes a 4" steel pole for \$617.00, install \$617.00 cement work \$50.00, fuel \$20.00, and tax \$66.35. American Flag builds these poles on site with a 5 year warranty.

Further research I have found that we will have to obtain a permit that could run up to \$380.00 and that American Flag uses a truck to drop the pole; this is not feasible with the location of our pole. The updated quote that includes hand trucking the pole into the area is \$1,586.35. I am asking for board approval of \$2,500.00 to cover any extra expenses that might arise.

Pool Entry Trellis:

The soil level has been lowered and we are preparing to have the trellis repainted (it is still under warranty) before we reconfigure the water lines for draught tolerant plants.



WE NEED YOUR HELP!!!

A number of years ago, roof rats came into our community from the Arcadia area.

These nasty rodents:

- ✓ Spread disease on contact, urine, feces, through insects;
- ✓ Cause structural damage your homes they chew on wires, insulation, wood, pipes;
- ✓ Make unsettling noises by running on your roofs and even in the crawl space under your roof and inside your walls;

Roof rates love trees and shrubbery – especially fruit trees.

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO ...

- 1. Pick excess fruit from your trees and off of the ground
- 2. Trim your trees away from your roofs <u>and your neighbor's</u> be a responsible homeowner and a good neighbor
- 3. Home-proof access into your home these ugly pests can crawl through a space the size of a nickel!
- 4. Remove pet food and water sources they also love bird seed
- 5. **Practice eRATication!** Many neighbors actively trap and kill the rats. Paul's Ace hardware can give you advice. One of our neighbors has reported success using the ultrasonic sound devices Paul's Ace Hardware sells.
- 6. **Contact St**. Mary's Food Bank they will place you on their list to pick your fruit and donate it to the Food Bank for a small fee. More information is on the next page.

If you don't want to do this, you should hire a professional to help.

Here is the bottom line: This is everyone's problem! You should have no fruit on your trees or on the ground after March 31!!!

Your excess citrus can become important nutrition for Arizona's hungry. Sign up to have your citrus trees gleaned for a small fee. Online registration is going on NOW and ends December 4, 2017. Please note that gleaning will start January 15th 2018 and ends on March 31, 2018. Gleaning schedule notifications will be sent as soon as your trees are scheduled for gleaning and you will be notified prior to the coming of the gleaning crew. You do not need to call for scheduling until the end of February in case we missed you.

ATTENTION: St, Mary's Food Bank Alliance will be gleaning in the following zip codes in 2018: 85018, 85251, 85373, 85374, and 85375.
