Many of you may be aware that the prior rumors about our local Fry's closing are actually true, despite previous denials from the company. There is currently a proposal before the City Planning Commission for a residential health care facility to be built on the Fry's property. A store manager at Fry's has now told our residents that the store is closing in June.

Don't shoot the messenger

The store closing cannot make any of us happy as we have all enjoyed the convenience of a neighborhood market, within a nice walk or short drive of our homes. It looks like the closure date, if accurate, is so near there is little hope for reprieve.

There are several alternative grocers just a few miles from Golden Keys. Here are suggestions for you to help mitigate the loss of the neighborhood store, particularly if you need transportation. I suggest looking at your alternatives sooner than later so you can be prepared.

If you have an elderly neighbor or anyone needing transportation assistance, perhaps you may occasionally offer to take them to the store when you go. Golden Keys residents have a great history of helping our neighbors.

Some of you may be fortunate to have family or friends to help take you shopping or to get items for you.

There are several grocery delivery options available – research them to see if those alternatives can work for you. If anyone currently uses a delivery service or wishes to do the research on a couple of alternatives, please write up the process and we can share this in a Key Lines later this summer.

If you have not previously checked out the City of Scottsdale's Cab Connection, now is the time to do so. This is an excellent program for City residents that offers taxi rides at an 80% discount — and you can share rides with your neighbors. https://www.scottsdaleaz.gov/transportation/transit

I want to offer a special reminder to anyone who uses Fry's for their prescriptions. It is easy to move your RX business to another Fry's pharmacy. It is also easy to move your business to a competitor such as Walgreens or Safeway — they can help you with a lot of that work. Once you have chosen a new pharmacy, be certain to advise your physician as many scripts are sent electronically and the doctor will need to know whom to contact.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH - Fran Nicoletti

With the warmer weather on its way, this is an easy make-ahead recipe.

Bow Tie Salad: (makes 4 servings)

½ lb. farfalle pasta (large bows)
6 slices pepperoni (cold cut type)
1 red bell pepper
1 Tbsp. capers

Pasta doesn't make you fat.

1 3 oz. can black pitted colossal olives **Dressing:**

½ c. olive oil½ tsp. salt3 Tbsp. red wine vinegar¼ tsp. black pepper3 Tbsp. water¼ tsp. oregano2 sprigs of Italian parsley1 garlic clove

Cook the pasta in boiling water with one teaspoon of salt. Cook al dente and drain. Seed and cut the red pepper into thin julienne strips. Cut the olives in halves; medium dice the pepperoni and using a garlic press, press the garlic. Mix the dressing in a jar and shake well. In a serving bowl, mix the pasta, red pepper strips, the olives, pepperoni and the capers. Add the dressing and toss to combine all. Refrigerate for 2 hours before serving.

KENTUCKY DERBY FACTS

- -Nineteen past winners have had names beginning with the letter "S," including <u>Secretariat</u>, the fastest horse in Kentucky Derby history, who completed the 1973 race in just under two minutes.
- -The amount of food consumed at the Derby is pretty astounding. On average, spectators will eat 142,000 hot dogs, 18,000 barbecue sandwiches, 13,800 pounds of beef, 32,400 jumbo shrimp, 9,000 scallops, 8,000 pounds of potatoes, 30,000 cookies and 300,000 strawberries. About 120,000 mint julips are consumed a the Derby each year.



Results of the March Neighborhood Assessment



The annual Neighborhood assessment was completed in late March. We had 45 findings this year. Thanks to all the volunteers who helped share the load so everyone's part could be done is less than an hour! We have distributed the notices to those who have a bit of maintenance to catch up on so if you did not receive one you can pat yourself on the back. Many of the findings related to deteriorating paint on alley walls. This seems to be an Achilles heal for the neighborhood. Please remember to look over your alley walls from time to time. It would also be VERY HELPFUL if everyone had their 4-digit street address on their alley wall or gate. This is requested by the City of Scottsdale to assist emergency personnel but also makes the assessment by our volunteers go more smoothly. Our volunteers (i.e., your neighbors) will greatly appreciate this when we do the fall assessment in October! Reminder: if you have wild flowers in your yard please remove them as soon as they have stopped blooming (which is now for most of the wild flowers)..

WE NEED YOUR HELP!!!

A number of years ago, roof rats came into our community from the Arcadia area.

These nasty rodents:

- √ Spread disease on contact, urine, feces, through insects;
- ✓ Cause structural damage your homes they chew on wires, insulation, wood, pipes;
- ✓ Make unsettling noises by running on your roofs and even in the crawl space under your roof and inside your walls;

Roof rates love trees and shrubbery – especially fruit trees.

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO ...

- 1. Pick excess fruit from your trees and off of the ground
- 2. Trim your trees away from your roofs <u>and your neighbor's</u> be a responsible homeowner and a good neighbor
- 3. Home-proof access into your home these ugly pests can crawl through a space the size of a nickel!
- 4. Remove pet food and water sources they also love bird seed
- 5. **Practice eRATication!** Many neighbors actively trap and kill the rats. Paul's Ace hardware can give you advice. One of our neighbors has reported success using the ultrasonic sound devices Paul's Ace Hardware sells.
- 6. **Contact St.** Mary's Food Bank they will place you on their list to pick your fruit and donate it to the Food Bank for a small fee. More information is on the next page.

If you don't want to do this, you should hire a professional to help.

Here is the bottom line: This is everyone's problem! You should have no fruit on your trees or on the ground after March 31!!!
