City and County Services and Regulations

Dogs

According to Maricopa County health code, pets are not allowed in the pool enclosure, and the City of Scottsdale requires that dogs must be on a leash not to exceed six (6) feet in length and must be directly under the owner's physical control at all times.

Alley Maintenance is the responsibility of the Scottsdale resident. Pick up after your dogs — even in the alleys. And **put your cigarette butts in the trash**. Let's all keep our neighborhood clean.

Lockboxes For Seniors

The Scottsdale Area Association of REALTORS, the Scottsdale Police and Fire Departments and the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office offer free emergency lockboxes to seniors whose annual income is less than \$25,000 and at a charge of \$25 for all others. The service is available to Scottsdale and Fountain Hills residents only.

Vacation Watch Request

Did you know you can notify the Scottsdale police when you are away on vacation using a form on their website? This long-standing service allows Scottsdale residents to request Police Officers drive by their home when they are on vacation. There is no guarantee officers will be able to check the home each day, and this service is subject to department priority calls.

Submit requests 48-72 hours prior to the start of your scheduled vacation.

Bulk and Brush Collection

Scottsdale Solid Waste provides monthly brush and bulk collection for residents who pay for residential collection services. This service provides an easy and convenient way for you to dispose of items too big to fit in your curbside container.

Brush includes:

- Tree limbs and branches: no longer than 6 feet
- Small clippings, grass, leaves and any loose material: bagged and tied

The **green waste** – yard clippings, branches and trimmings – will be composted to help grow new plants.

Please do **NOT** put your green waste in the 300-gallon trash bins.

Bulk items include furniture and mattresses. Please do **NOT** put these "treasures" out early. This encourages treasure hunters to roam our neighborhood and provides a leg up for anyone who wants to hop into our yards when the items are placed up against block walls.

Recipe of the Month

Savory Party Bread comes from Taste of Home. It makes a stunning presentation and tastes great.

- One unsliced round sourdough bread
- ½ cup butter melted
- 1 lb Monterey Jack Cheese
- ½ cup chopped green onions
- 2 to 3 teaspoons poppy seeds

Preheat oven to 350°. Cut bread widthwise into 1-in. slices to within 1/2 in. of bottom of loaf. Repeat cuts in opposite direction. Cut cheese into 1/4-in. slices; cut slices into small pieces. Place cheese in cuts in bread.

In a small bowl, mix butter, green onions and poppy seeds; drizzle over bread. Wrap in foil; place on a baking sheet. Bake for 15 minutes. Unwrap; bake until cheese is melted, about 10 minutes longer.

Note: Make this your own by using a cheese of your choice. You can add olives or get creative and add ingredients to your liking.
